

Trump claims victory in 2024 election

The AP (Associated Press) has called the race, Donald Trump has beaten Kamala Harris 312 electoral votes to 226, winning the 2024 presidential election. What was initially predicted by publications such as MSNBC, ABC News, The Economist, etc., to be a much closer election—or even one entirely in Kama-

la Harris's favor, as purported by the notoriously accurate electionprognosticator Dr. Allan Lichtman has instead ended in a landslide victory for Trump. Former 45th president of the United States and soon-to-be 47th won a staggering seven out of seven swing states, four of which have historically favored the Democratic Party since 2000. That is, until Trump's 2016 and 2024

campaigns—a phenomenon exemplifying the increasingly polarizing landscape of American part of American pol-

Following the night of the election Nov. 5, in the early morning hours of Nov. 6—when not all electoral votes were counted, but he had secured 276 after winning the state of Wisconsin (six more than the necessary 270)— Trump held a triumphant victory speech at his estate in West Palm Beach, Florida.

On stage, he referred to his Make America Great Again (MAGA) initiative as "the greatest political movement of all time," and stated that his second

term would usher in the "Golden Age of America." Joined by his family and rice presidential nominee J.D. whom Vance, he said "turned out to be a good choice," Trump also correctly called that Re publicans would maintain control of the House of Representatives and shouted out billionaire tech mogul Elon Musk, who aggressively cam-paigned on Trump's behalf in the final stretch of the electionmost notably through mil-\$200` lion endowment

> into the presi

dent-elect's super Political Action Committee (PAC).

Conversely, Harris delivered a downcast concession speech that same night from her alma mater, Howard University, urging her supporters to "continue the fight that fueled this campaign." Addressing a massive crowd of her followers, who had hoped to see her elected as the first female president in US history, Harris stated, "the outcome of this

election was not what we wanted, not what we fought for, not what we voted for, but hear me when I say the light of America's promise will always burn bright as long as we never give up and as long as we keep fighting. Subtly referencing Trump's denial of the 2020 election results she

also affirmed that "a fundamental principle of American democracy is that when we lose an election, we accept the results."

Harris will preside over Congress' counting of elecover toral votes on Jan. 6 to reaffirm Trump's victopeacefully, ă surrender that will contrast the president-elect's response to his own electoral loss almost four years ago.

Truth revealed about Black Friday scams

As Thanksgiving approaches, so does the most anticipated sale of the fall: Black Friday. When going about holiday shopping, it is easy to be blinded by the motivation of saving money and miss the tricks present in Black Friday advertisements and sales. It's important to keep in mind that stores are happy when people spend money, not when they save money. As such, all of their marketing and sale strategies do not revolve around helping the customer save but rather prompting them to spend as much as possible.

The first rule of thumb for all shoppers is to exercise common sense. Deals that sound too good to be true probably are, especially if they are on questionable sites. Any money spent on a sale that seems strange can likely be written off as unrecoverable. Even though this type of scam is present year-round, it seems to affect more people on Black Friday. Just last year, Barclays Bank warned that there was a 22 percent increase in money lost to purchase scams on Black Friday. Sales that sound unlikely can be easily avoided using some common sense.

Another technique that stores use to convince shoppers to buy more is to offer additional discounts for opening a store credit card. Although signing up for a store account is usually harmless, with the only downside being daily email spam, opening a credit card comes with a host of risks. Generally, store credit cards have high Annual Percentage Rates (APRs), which add extra late fees if the bill isn't paid in full every month, and store credit cards have even higher APRs. For example, according to a study conducted by Bankrate, "Retail credit cards charge an average of 30.45 percent APR." In contrast, the national average for regular credit cards is 20.93 percent. If the card balance isn't paid off in full every month, the amount owed could increase by almost onethird per month.

To avoid missing out on deals, it is also valuable to use an anonymous browser window. Some stores display different products for different shoppers based on their cookies, so if a customer would usually pay full price, they will likely be shown full-price items. Similarly, if a customer's cookies indicate that they usually purchase sale items, products with discounted prices may be shown first on their screen. Google's incognito mode does not save cookies, so web-

mode does not save cookies, so websites visited are unable to track an incognito mode user's online behavior.

Finally, the most difficult sales strategies to avoid involve a customer's perception of sales. Many stores implement a simultaneous markup and markdown on a product, ultimately bringing its price back to or even higher than it usually is. A Which? study on Black Friday sales in 2022 found that "98 percent [of Black Friday sale products] were the same price or less at other times of the year." Thus, simply because a store offers a discount does not mean that offers a discount does not mean that the product is cheaper than it normally is. To avoid this, a customer may try keeping track of a product's price in the months leading up to Black Friday and decide if they are willing to buy the item at the stated price.

In general, the purpose of a company is to make money, so its pricing will reflect that purpose. There isn't necessarily anything right or wrong about their need to make money, so the responsibility lies on the consumer to remain vigilant about their purchasing decisions. All in all, when faced with the "perfect" deal, remember: stores will almost never sell at a loss, even if it is Black Friday.

Mann's on the Lake is a new restaurant in Lake Oswego on 40 N State Street, next door to the Lake Theater in downtown LO. The building was previously occupied by Stickman's, another restaurant, and was remodeled over the summer to become Mann's on the Lake. Mann's on the Lake is associated with Duke's Public House and Aji Tram, two other local restaurants under the same owner, Eric Mann. The remodeled building is drastically different from what it was before and it now has 110 seats inside and 140 seats outside on the deck that overlooks the scenic lake. Mann's will be the only restaurant in Lake Oswego that is actually on the lake. Its proximity to a boat dock allows for easy access to customers.

Mann's On the Lake is unique because of its lake-front location and "New American Cuisine," a modern take on a seafood and steak house. To focus on the Pacific Northwest style of food, the cuisine is locally sourced from mainly either Oregon and Washington. As a result of the food options, the menu is carefully crafted by Chef Kenny Giambalvo, who has many years of experience in several different restaurants such as Blue Hour and Pazzo which were both located in Portland until they closed. The general manager of the restaurant is Justin Riedl, who also has prior experience in working as a general manager at Mcmenamins

and Domaine Serene Vineyards & Winery. The restaurant had its grand opening on Oct. 29. It has attracted a plentiful number of customers from all parts of the city, and has goals to grow in popularity once summer comes around. A notable design element of the restaurant is its outdoor patio and view of the lake with easy access for boaters so it is expected to thrive during the warmer months. On Sundays, the hours are from 10 A.M.-10 P.M; Monday-Thursday the hours are from 11 A.M.-10 P.M; Fridays are from 11 A.M.-12 A.M; and on Saturdays, the hours are 10 A.M.-12 A.M.

Oregon implements new ballot measures

With the voting on Nov. 5 over, two out of the four measures on the Oregon ballot passed, these being measures 115 and 119. The race for the House of Representatives has Districts one, three, four, five and six going to the Democrats, whereas the Republicans won the east of the state with District two.

Measure 115 makes it so that the state legislature can impeach the executive branch of our state government much the same way it works nationally. Measure 119 will make it easier for workers in the cannabis industry to unionize by requiring employers to enter into

"labor peace agreements."

Measure 116, which did not pass, was intended to establish an independent commission to set civil servants' pay. Measure 117, which would have established a rank-choice voting system for federal and state elections,

also did not pass. If the measure passed, Measure 118 would have increased the corporate tax by three percent and given it back to Oregonian citizens. Oregonians voted against this because this measure would have most likely increase the price of goods and services, offsetting the kickback that they would

The State Legislature remains within the Democrats' control, and our national House of Representatives has Districts one, three, four, five and six going to the Democrats, whereas District two is to the Republicans. The governor was not for election this year, because we voted in 2022, and the State House and Senate are both blue, as they historically have been. The counties have voted as they typically have within historical margins. District five was a hotly contested House Seat. Janelle Bynum flipped the incumbent Lori Chaves-DeReme's seat by just three percent.

Former One Direction member, Liam Payne, died at 31 after falling from a third-story balcony at a hotel in Buenos Aires on Oct. 16, 2024. While the cause of his tragic death is still unclear, toxicology reports have revealed that the singer had 'pink cocaine' in his system—a mix of ecstasy, ket-amine, methamphetamine and

other drugs. There were many strange circumstances surrounding the lead up to Payne's death. Employees of the hotel where Payne

Crowds of people gathered around the place where Payne died, lighting candles, putting up pictures and singing some of his songs as a way to honor his memory.

Like many students here at LO, senior Arya Lewis has grown up listening to One Direction. She claims that she has known of them since she was a kid, but she became "a real fan" in 2020. "It's weird that he was so young because that was a part of my childhood. We all kind of expected them to do so much more," said Lewis.

For many students and fans, his death has made them reflect on their own lives. "I think most people just go through life thinking they're going to live to be like 100," junior Callie Schmitke said. 'Then, you look at Liam Payne, who

He has lost his

ability to speak but still writes a letter to the team each week to help them mentally prepare for which-ever opponent they will face. Though Young is thoroughly involved in the current LOHS community, he also has a place in the heart of many Laker alumnus. According to his former classmates, Young was a football star and the life of the party when he attended LOHS. One of Young's classmates explained that even in highschool Young was resilient and said, "if you were out playing [football], he would play harder."

Other friends of Young described him as "larger than life" and ex-plained that he always found a way into the spotlight whether it was for his quick witted humor, adventur-ous lifestyle or impressive athletic

and musical abilities. His friends expressed that the most devas-tating part of watching Young's diagnosis progress was his loss of speech, as they were saddened for those who were never able to experience his hysterical jokes and incredible stories.

Young is also one of the fac-

es of a local organization called Live Heads Up. This organization was founded by a woman named Chris Dudley who has made it her mission to encourage our society to pursue life's best view. She created Live Heads Up in order to spread her ideas far and wide and has done a wonderful job at gaining community involvement. Dudley and Young joined forces to create the ultimate positivity campaign at LOHS, and Young's friends described him as "the perfect fit" for this project considering that he already possessed the "Live Heads Up mentality." Chick-fil-a opening in LO represents the growing influence of corporate culture

Anyone who has driven along Kruse Way on their way to enter the OR-217 highway or has simply visited the Centrepoint Starbucks in the past few months has seen the new Chick-fil-A sign. It is forecasted to open to the public this year. However, is this really the cause for cele-

bration everyone seems to think it is?

Lake Oswego's first Chick-fil-A replaces the Stanford's Restaurant & Bar location on Kruse Oaks Drive. Not only does it represent how Lake Oswego is growing in influence, but it is also representative of a nation-wide shift to embracing corporate culture. Instead of a city packed with numerous small businesses, LO may be slowly transitioning to a washed-out model of corporate conformity.

model of corporate conformity.

After the COVID pandemic, many local businesses found themselves unable to recover from the economic difficulties they experienced. Consequently, many were forced to close their doors. Stanford's Restaurant & Bar was one such example; local to the Oregon and Washington area, it was a staple of the Lake Oswego community from 1990 to its eventual close in 2022 – a 32-year legacy.

In contrast, while small businesses were floundering, large fast-food chains were able to bounce back relatively quickly. Local restau

to bounce back relatively quickly. Local restau-

rants began steadily increasing prices as they tried to make up for COVID losses, and gradually people turned to cheaper alternatives such as fast food. This shift prompted sit-down restaurants to raise their prices even more in an attempt to maintain their vanishing. an attempt to maintain their vanishing

foothold in the food industry. However, these price increases only worsened the vicious cycle, causing even more people to convert to fast food.

Fast food corporations purchased and continue to purchase their materials at lower prices than smaller restaurants, due to their ability to buy in bulk and place less emphasis on freshness, so they are able to sell their food at lower prices. Therefore, even though they also wildly raised their prices compared to lo their prices, compared to lo-cal restaurants, fast food still remains significantly cheaper. Additionally, although many small businesses source their products locally, Chick-fil-A, like many other fast food chains, focus-

es on quick service over the quality of their products, allowing it to operate with lower costs. Similarly, because local suppliers also

struggled during the pandemic, restaurants that sourced from them also bore the harmful

However, others argue that Chick-fil-A is preferable to an alternative fast food chain,

e to an alternative fast food chain, as it is known for being slightly healthier and more community-centric. Almost every Chick-fil-A is franchised and individually operated, while many other fast food chains have strong centralized organizations. Therefore, the Lake Oswego Chick-fil-A may be operated to some extent by a member of the community who may reduce the influence of the central corporant.

One thing is certain: with the addition of Chick-fil-A, Lake Oswego is cementing its status as a growing city. However, growth is not always synonymous with progress, and the choice to either support or reject corporate culture still remains up to the discretion of the individual. Nonetheless, for a going to the pay Lake Oswaga Chick before going to the new Lake Oswego Chick-

fil-A, it is important to consider all the consequences of buying their products and thus supporting the growing influence of corporations.



On Nov. 2, 2024, Portland citizens donned their favorite Portland Thorns jerseys, crafted heartfelt signs and flooded the stands at Providence Park to honor the retirement of one of the greatest soccer players to ever grace the (National Women's Soccer League) NWSL stage: Christine Sinclair.

Sinciair, a renowned forward who announcéd her imminent retirement from professional club soccer in September, is widely known as one of the best soccer players ever to do it. Sinclair played collegiate soccer at the University of Port-land and spent the last decade of her career playing for the Portland Thorns where she earned significant recognition for her high level of play and eventually became the team's captain. Before retiring from international play, Sinclair represented Canada on the international stage where she helped her country to win an Olympic gold medal and two bronzes along with a "Confederation of North, Central America and Caribbean Association Football" (CONCACAF) championship. She also earned the title of the top international goal scorer for mens and women's soccer with upwards of 190 goals throughout her career. NCAA rules changes roster limits

As part of a recent settlement agreement, the NCAA has made changes to the allowed roster size of sports across the collegiate level. These changes, starting in the 2025-2026 school year, will cause drastic cuts and changes to scholarships of programs with bigger teams, which will also impact future recruiting. The new changes have both positive and negative aspects to it, depending on each player's situation and sport. The new rules dictate that NCAA D1 schools will no longer have a scholarship cap and will be able to award any number of athletes on their roster a scholarship. This eliminates the previous sport-specific limits and allows financially flexible support for D1 teams. However, with that rule, there will

be new roster limits that all D1 NCAA teams will have to conform to by the next school year (2025-2026). With this rule, most programs will be able to offer more scholarships, as long as they follow roster limits. Scholar-ship type has also changed, with all sports to be considered equivalency sports, allowings schools and programs to offer partial scholarships.

The difference that this makes for collegiate level sports is that walk-ons will slowly be impacted by this new rule. Although more scholar-ships will be able to be awarded, since the scholarship cap was removed, due to the roster size changes, class recruiting will become more scarce and possibly a tricky feat for coaches. Many current teams will have to cut a decent amount of their players if they exceed new roster limits, which will impact a number of college athletes.

Skylight band strikes a chord

In recent years, the popularity of indie rock has skyrocketed. Many new bands have emerged from the midst of this genre, all unique in their own production of music. One such example can be found at LOHS.
